All groups have a Very High evaluation of the Quality of Education that students are receiving. Parents have the lowest satisfaction rate. Is this because they think the work is not challenging enough, or because they are less aware of the academic rigor in the classrooms, or just have different expectations from when they went to school? Regardless, continuing to focus on exciting learning opportunities for students, finding ways to connect curriculum to real life, and building expertise and confidence with new curriculums are essential to maintaining our high standard. Engaging with parents through traditional and usual forms of communication as well at our "Soaring the Summit" Initiative are also important to connect with parents and help them have a better understanding of student work expectations, and assessment.

#### **Evaluation**

Our staff work hard to maintain good communication with our families in all areas of education. Our Teacher Counselor and Student Support Worker do a great job of helping our families connect with supports and services. When support services are needed, we work with families to help them connect with outside service agencies such as LFS, Medical professionals, FASD Clinic, FASD Instructional Coaches, and SWCSS as well as community physical and mental wellness organizations like the YMCA. #### Evaluation

The number of parents satisfied with involvement declined from last year. With the change to our "Soaring the Summit" initiative, it provides more of an opportunity for parents to see evidence of student work.
